Making Appropriate Referrals for Librarians: Repositories, Books, Websites, Portals, and Professionals



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When a patron comes to you with a genealogical question what should you do? Where should you point them? How do you help them get to the right places, particularly online?

Dismantling a Genealogy Research Question

- The first thing to do is determine what their genealogical question is, keeping in mind that it is quite common for them to not really know what that is themselves.
 - They may have multiple questions all jumbled up into one long story.
 - Get them to focus on one person and/or one event at a time.
- Have them write out the questions, complete with details of what they already know about their ancestor. This includes full names, event dates, and full place names (city, county, state/province, country, etc.).
 - Timelines are a great way to take a research question and break it up into individual events with dates and places indicated. These can be quickly handwritten or planned out and created in something like Word. (See also: <u>https://CyndisList.com/timelines</u>)

- Maps work hand-in-hand with timelines to help pinpoint where an ancestor was located and what area needs to be covered for the research being done. (See also: <u>https://CyndisList.com/maps</u>)
- Using the *when* and the *where* info, point them to the types of resources and repositories discussed below.
 - Look for repositories in the areas in which their ancestors lived.
 - Look for collections that cover the time-period and the location they are interested in.
 - Start with your own library's collections or those repositories in your area that have materials which work for the research question.
 - Move on to online resources next.
 - Those resources should lead you to repositories in other areas with materials you need.

Locate each of the genealogical and historical societies (county, state, region, country, etc.) that cover the area(s) in which the ancestor lived. Determine if they have a library or a relationship with a repository in the area. Learn about what type of access they have to records that may help. Many societies also have online databases and publications. You can use Google or

U.S. State Level Repositories

Most states in the United States have a state library, state archives, state historical society, and a state genealogical society. In some cases, those repositories are combined, with their collections housed together. In other cases, the repositories support one another when it comes to housing their collections and digitizing them. Partnerships are formed and dismantled, morphed, and moved, all depending on accessibility to research collections and the finances necessary to maintain, preserve, and digitize them.

More and more repositories are making their electronically accessible online. Many states call these web sites a "digital archive" or a "digital memory." They often include collections from other repositories within the state, not just those at the state-level institutions. This includes some overlap with university libraries and archives. Keep in mind to check web sites for each institution as well as a possible digital archive collaboration web site. Sometimes the collections on each are different.
